WHAT RESEARCH SAYS ABOUT PARENT AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Family Engagement (as defined by the National Parent Teacher Association) is the participation of families in every facet of the education and development of children from birth to adulthood, recognizing that families are the primary influence in their children's lives. Family engagement takes many forms, including families' shared responsibilities in decisions about their children's education, health, and well-being, as well as participation in organizations that reflect the community's collaborative aspirations for all children. Families help their children have success in school by daily encouraging, listening, monitoring, praising, reacting, and discussing; not necessarily "teaching" school subjects. Family engagement should not be limited to volunteering or attending school sponsored events. The broad view of engagement affirms the families' role as the child's primary teacher and the home as the child's first classroom (Barbour, 1966). Engaging every family in a child's education is an important piece of improving that child's learning, according to research by Joyce Epstein, director of the Center for School, Family, and Community Partnerships at John Hopkins University in Baltimore, Maryland.

The framework of family engagement, as derived by the PTA's National Standards for Family-School Partnerships and adopted by the TN State Board of Education on July 30, 2010, includes the following:

- Welcoming all families into the school community- Families are active participants in the life of the school and feel welcomed, valued, and connected to each other, to school staff, and to what students are learning and doing in class and school.
- Communicating effectively- Families and school staff engage in regular, meaningful communication about student learning.
- Supporting student success- Families and school staff continuously work together to support students' learning and healthy development both at home and school, and have regular opportunities to strengthen their knowledge and skills to do so effectively.
- Speaking up for each child- Families are informed and enabled to be advocates for their own and other children, to ensure that students are treated fairly and have access to learning opportunities that will support their success.
- Sharing power- Families and school staff are equal partners with equal representation in decisions that affect students and families and together inform, influence, and create policies, practices, and programs.
- <u>Collaborating with community</u>- Families and school staff work together with community members to connect students, families, and staff to expanded learning opportunities, community services, and civic participation.

When families are involved in their children's education in positive ways, children achieve higher grades and test scores, have better attendance at school, complete more homework, demonstrate more positive attitudes and behavior, graduate at higher rates, and have greater enrollment in higher education (Becher 1984, Ballen and Moles, 1966).

Every research study on family engagement conducted in the past 20 years has shown the same result: family engagement increases student achievement and self-esteem. Research has shown this to be true in large and small communities; from preschool through high school; in poor and affluent areas; and in urban, rural and suburban communities. What families do to help their children learn is even more important to their academic success than how well-off the family is (Walberg, 1994).

CONCERNS AT THE UPPER GRADES:

Research shows that there is an inadequate level of parent and family engagement, especially in the upper grades (Binns, Steinburg, and Amorosi, 1998).

In the upper grades, teachers report that (1) there is a greater number of uninvolved families and (2) a lack of family support especially in doing schoolwork at home.

In the middle grades, teachers report that (1) families do not devote enough time to their children's education; (2) families attend only one or two meetings at school after the school year begins; (3) families do not visit their children's classes; (4) families do not contact their child's school about their academic progress; and (5) families do not talk to school officials about academic programs at the different grade levels.

BARRIERS: (What keeps families from participating in their child's education?)

- Many families, especially those employed outside the home, do not have enough time.
- Many families feel ill-informed about how and why academic decisions are made about their children.
- Some families feel that educators do not care about their opinions or concerns.
- Teachers do not have enough time to maintain communication with families and engage them in school
- Teachers are rarely trained or supported in engaging families, and, according to the 2005 MetLife Survey
 of the American Teacher, find family engagement to be their biggest challenge. Lela Spielberg, Flamboyan

- In some schools that have high proportions of poor or minority students, a barrier may be lack of education to help with schoolwork.
- Cultural/socio-economic and language differences between families and staff.
- Family and staff attitudes.
- Perceived lack of safety in the school area after school hours.

PRINCIPLES FOR BUILDING EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES FOR PARENT AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMS:

- The school must operate from principles that respect the unique role of the family in a child's homeschool relationship.
- All families have strengths and should know they are valued.
- All families can make a contribution to their child's education and to the school program.
- All families have the capacity to learn developmental and educational techniques to help their children.
- All families have a perspective on their children that can be important and useful to teachers.
- Family-child relationships are different from teacher-child relationships.
- Families should be consulted in all decisions about family engagement.
- All families really do care about their children (Becher, 1984).

Family and parent engagement is most effective when it is comprehensive, well-planned, long- lasting, and when it takes a positive approach, rather than focusing on remedial intervention. Families do not have to be well-educated in order to help; in fact, children from low-income and minority families have the most to gain when schools engage families.

WHAT ARE WE CURRENTLY DOING?

As an integral part of planning for and writing this plan, the Weakley County Parent and Family Engagement Team, as part of the Family Friendly Schools Training, circulated surveys to every family in the Weakley County School system. These surveys were returned and data analyses were made and reviewed. The activities listed below are the outcome of those survey results as they relate to the six areas in the framework of parent and family engagement.

1-Welcoming Families 2-Communicating Effectively 3-Supporting Success
4-Speaking up for Each Child 5-Sharing Power 6- Collaborating with Community

DISTRICT LEVEL

1-Welcoming Families:

The Weakley County School District provides technical assistance to schools in helping to plan and implement effective parent and family engagement activities through such events as meetings with school principals, meetings with family-groups, providing financial support for allowable parent and family engagement functions, literacy and technology parent trainings, and other pertinent activities per request. Weakley County Schools promotes family and community support in programs for English Language Learners (ELL) students.

2-Communicating Effectively

The Weakley County School District publishes and distributes a Student Handbook, which is sent home to each family at the beginning of each school year. This book contains most of the pertinent information and policies that families need, including a directory for schools with personnel and phone numbers. To ensure that school related

information regarding programs, meetings, and other activities is available to parents in a format that can be easily understood, the Weakley County School District will maintain a system-wide website. Information regarding meetings, special events and school lunch menus will also appear in the local newspapers and radio PSAs as deemed practical. An additional feature on the system-wide website will be the listing of grade level curriculum by month so that families will know what their child is learning. The ParentVue Portal has also been activated by each school. This program is a free online resource where parents can log on and view their child's grades, schedule, attendance, and discipline issues. Teacher contact information is also available on this link.

3-Supporting School Success 4- Speak up for Each Child

The Weakley County School District provides training for families and staff in ways to implement new initiatives under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Thus far, family trainings have included Love, Read, Learn and basic computer skills training, just to name a few. Showing our commitment toward supporting school success and our desire for families to better advocate for their children. Weakley County Schools has employed a Parent and Family Engagement Coordinator with the intent to act as a liaison between schools and families. It is our hope that by creating a better foundation for communication between teachers and parents, a more comfortable environment will be created. Families will be able to better monitor their child's progress and have the confidence to partner with educators to improve student achievement.

5-Sharing Power

The Weakley County School District holds an annual meeting to which families, school personnel, and interested citizens are invited to have input and ask questions about both the design and implementation of all federally funded school programs, including parent and family engagement requirements. One important part of these requirements is to annually evaluate the content and effectiveness of the parent and family engagement plan.

6-Collaborating with Community

The Weakley County School District meets and coordinates strategies and plans with other programs having similar goals and responsibilities for parent and family engagement, including but not limited to Reading First, Pre-School, and Head Start.
