Enrollment in Advanced and College Level Courses

ADVANCED COURSES

Students in grades seven through twelve (7-12) may enroll in available advanced courses including, but not limited to, advanced English language arts, mathematics, science, or social studies courses.¹

To enroll in these courses, students shall meet the following standards: TCAP scores at the Ontrack level or above from the most recent available test, A or B average in the content area(s) of the advanced class(es), Pre-requisite courses (where applicable).

The principal of each school shall have the authority to require additional criteria for the enrollment in advanced courses to fit the needs of the students within the school.

NOTIFICATION

Parent(s)/guardian(s) shall be provided written notification of a student's eligibility to enroll in advanced courses. The notification shall state that a student will remain enrolled in the course unless the parent/guardian timely submits a written request for removal.

Students may also be removed from an advanced course if the student's teacher determines that the student should be removed based on performance after thirty (30) days of instruction and the principal approves the request to remove the student.

COLLEGE LEVEL COURSES

Students in the 10th, 11th, or 12th grades who are in good standing may earn high school credit by enrolling in college level courses which are conducted at times other than the regular school day at an institution of higher education.² Written approval by the principal shall be required before enrollment, and an agreement from the parent/guardian must be signed and on file at the school.

 1. To be eligible, students must meet the participating institution's admissions criteria.

2. Students must be in good standing, maintaining at least a 3.0 grade point average and earning the recommendation of the teacher and/or principal.

3. Students may participate in college level courses conducted during the school day on the high school campus in accordance with requirements stated in the state regulations.

Interscholastic Athletics

Issued Date: 5/3/2018

No person shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, be treated differently from another person or otherwise be discriminated against in any athletic program of the school. Equal athletic opportunity shall be provided for members of both sexes.

Student athletes shall only be allowed to participate in athletic activities or events that align with the student's sex indicated on his/her original birth certificate.

The Director of Schools/designee shall require the parent/guardian to provide the student's original birth certificate prior to participation in any interscholastic athletics. If the original birth certificate is not available or does not indicate the student's sex at the time of birth, the parent/guardian shall provide medical documentation showing evidence of the student's sex at birth.

Notwithstanding the requirements of the paragraph above, a recipient may operate or sponsor separate teams for members of each sex where selection for such teams is based upon competitive skill or the activity involved in a contact sport. However, where a recipient operates or sponsors a team in a particular sport for members of one sex but operates or sponsors no such team for members of the other sex, and athletic opportunities for members of that sex have previously been limited, members of the excluded sex must be allowed to try-out for the team offered unless the sport involved is a contact sport. For the purposes of this part, contact sports include boxing, wrestling, rugby, ice hockey, football, basketball and other sports the purpose or major activity of which involves bodily contact.

 Participation in extracurricular activities is a privilege offered by the school. Students must adhere to established rules and codes of conduct for each activity. It is the responsibility of the student to adhere to the prescribed rules and codes of conduct. Failure to abide by such codes may result in consequences up to, and including, removal from participation.

Interscholastic athletics shall be administered as a part of the regular school program and shall be the principal's responsibility. The principal or his/her designee must accompany an athletic team on trips.

 School athletics shall be coached only by regularly employed personnel if governed by TSSAA regulations. Full-time administrators will serve the entire school day performing administrative duties. These persons may be assigned coaching duties during hours outside of the regular school day. Volunteers who assist with coaching at any school must be approved by the principal, the Director of Schools and the Board.

4.301 Interscholastic Athletics

There shall be a complete annual physical examination of every student prior to his/her participation in interscholastic athletics.³ Cost of the examination shall be borne by the parent or guardian of the student. These records shall be on file in the principal's office.

Each parent or guardian is encouraged to provide health and hospitalization insurance for all students participating in interscholastic athletics.

No principal or teacher of any school under the control of the Board shall dismiss his/her school or any group of students for the purpose of permitting them to practice or play baseball, football, basketball or any similar game within the regular school hours of any school day of the week without written permission from the Board. This does not prevent the inclusion of regular physical training lessons in the daily school program.⁴

Coaches and other employees of the school district shall not encourage, permit, condone or tolerate hazing activities as part of the athletic program.⁵

Students shall not be disqualified from participation on a school athletic team solely on the basis of participation in another sport except where the season overlaps by more than two weeks. Principals shall ensure that practices are confined to established seasons and that school regulations regarding participation in a sport are reasonable.

Students who move out of their school area but who wish to continue attendance in the original school may continue to participate in athletics. The Board specifically forbids the recruitment of students in any fashion.

Athletic schedules shall be filed in each school principal's office.

Transportation of teams to athletic games is approved by the Board.

STUDENT SAFETY

No action shall be taken by any coach or athlete that will endanger the safety of any participant.

Initiations shall be conducted with a dignity in keeping with the purposes of the organization.

The nature of any initiation shall be outlined and presented in writing to the club sponsor and the principal of the school for approval prior to the actual initiation. Hazing of students is strictly prohibited. Any organization which permits an initiation to go beyond the scope of activities planned and previously approved will be suspended until reinstated by the principal.

4.301 Interscholastic Athletics

Athletics are co-curricular sports activities under the direct control of the school principal. The principal will be directly accountable to the director of schools and the Board in all matters pertaining to athletics, according to TSSAA regulations. Weakley County middle schools will:

1. Play a maximum of eight (8) regular season football games.

2. Game starting times will be set by the schools.

3. Play a maximum of 20 games during a school year. Tournaments shall count as two games notwithstanding the number of games in which each team participates in a tournament.⁶

4. If a student is 15 before August 1 of that school year, he/she is ineligible to play football or basketball.

5. A student repeating a grade is ineligible for the entire season.

6. An eighth grader who has passing grades and is retained at the request of his/her parent(s) or guardian(s) becomes ineligible to play football or basketball in middle school.

7. Any school athletic program found in violation of requirements above shall forfeit the game in which the ineligible student participated.

8. The coaches will mail a list of players and their ages to the director of school's office before their first football or basketball game.

9. A student who participates in a sport at one Weakley County school is not eligible to participate in that same sport at another Weakley County school during that same school year.

10. All change of eligibility for the second semester will take effect on the first day of the second semester. Amendments to the eligibility list in the director of school's office must be made prior to participation in any games during the second semester.

11. The middle school football teams (schools not members of TMSAA) are to be the Reelfoot Conference. A championship and a runner-up trophy will be awarded. Each member will pay \$25.00 at the beginning of the year for the cost of trophies. Coaches will select the All-Conference Team. The number to be selected All-Conference will be determined at the end of each season. Schools will pay for their own players' awards.

12. The middle school basketball teams will have a Weakley County Class A tournament to determine the Class A champion and runner-up. If Martin Middle decides to participate in the tournament (prior to the season starting) then the tournament will be the Weakley

County Tournament with a Weakley County champion and runner-up. Coaches will select the All-Weakley County Class A Team.

13. The following rotation will be followed to determine the location for the Weakley County Class A basketball tournament: 1. Gleason, 2. Dresden, 3. Martin, 4. Sharon, 5. Greenfield.

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SECONDARY ATHLETICS

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12 13 Bylaws of the Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association shall regulate the operation and control of secondary athletics. No credit will be awarded for interscholastic athletic practice during the school day.

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Attendance is a key factor in student achievement. Therefore, students are expected to be present each day that school is in session.

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The attendance supervisor shall oversee the entire attendance program which shall include: 1

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1. All accounting and reporting procedures and their dissemination;

8 9 2. Alternative program options for students who severely fail to meet minimum attendance requirements;

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3. Ensuring that all school age children attend school;

11 12 4. Assisting the Board with the enforcement of the compulsory attendance laws of the state; 5. Providing documentation of enrollment status upon request for students applying for new

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or reinstatement of driver's permit or license; and 6. Notifying the Department of Safety whenever a student with a driver's permit or license withdraws from school.²

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Student attendance records shall be given the same level of confidentiality as other student records. Only authorized school officials with legitimate educational purposes may have access to student information without the consent of the student or parent/guardian.³

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Absences shall be classified as either excused or unexcused as determined by the principal or his/her designee. Excused absences shall include:

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1. Personal illness or injury;

2. Illness of immediate family member; 25 26

3. Death in the family; 4. Extreme weather conditions;

28 5. Religious observances;⁴ or 29

6. Circumstances which in the judgment of the principal create emergencies over which the student has no control.

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The principal shall be responsible for ensuring that:5

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- 1. Attendance is checked and reported daily for each class;
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2. Daily absentee sheets contain sign in/sign out sheets and indicate students present or absent for the majority of the day;

- 4. Written excuses are submitted for absences and tardiness:
- 5. Systemwide procedures for accounting and reporting are followed.

APPROVED EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Students participating in out-of-school activities shall be counted as present only when the activities are school directed, related to an instructional activity, and have prior approval of the local board of education.⁶

High school students participating in postsecondary school visits may be counted present under the following conditions:⁷

• The student shall only be counted present the day of the postsecondary visit and shall not be counted present during any travel days.

Students may be counted present for postsecondary visits for a maximum of five (5) days per school year.
The student's parent or legal guardian must submit prior notice of the visit, specifying the

date of the postsecondary school visit.
The student must submit documentation from a campus official of the postsecondary institution. Acceptable documentation includes a signed letter or form.

• Students must complete all school work missed during the postsecondary school visit.

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• Postsecondary visits are not required of any student.

• Parents or legal guardians are solely responsible for facilitating postsecondary school visits and for ensuring the safety of the student(s) during the visit.

 A maximum of five (5) days during the school year may be excused for educational activities, i.e., travel/study trips, participation in academic contests, etc. that are not sponsored by the school or school district.

Requests for approval of educational activities exceeding five (5) days must be presented to the Weakley County Board of Education for consideration and approval as an excused absence.

EXCUSED ABSENCE - MILITARY

- a. A one (1) day excused absence is provided for students when their parent or custodian is deployed into active military service.
- b. A one (1) day excused absence is also provided for students when the parent or custodian returns from active military service.
- c. Excused absences up to ten (10) days are provided for visitation when the member is granted rest and recuperation leave and is stationed out of the country.
- d. Excused absences for up to ten (10) days cumulatively within the school year are provided for visitation during the member's deployment cycle.

Total excused absences under (c) and (d) shall not exceed a total of ten (10) days within the school year. The student shall provide documentation to the school as proof of the service member's deployment.⁸

MAKE-UP WORK

• A student with an unexcused absence has no right to make up any school work.

• It is the student's responsibility to arrange for make-up work or tests.

• Homework or tests assigned prior to an absence will be due the day the student returns to school.

• Homework or tests assigned during the student's absence must completed and turned in by the same number of days of his/her absence, plus one day.

 Homework or tests not made up during the specified amount of time may result in a zero for that work.

CREDIT/PROMOTION DENIAL

Credit/promotion denial determinations may include student attendance; however, student attendance may not be the sole criterion. However, if attendance is a factor, prior to credit/promotion denial, the following shall occur:

1. Parents and students shall be advised if a student is in danger of credit/promotion denial due to excessive absenteeism.

2. Due process procedures are available to the student when credit or promotion is denied.

PROGRESSIVE TRUANCY INTERVENTION PLAN¹⁰¹¹

All absences are unexcused until a note explaining the absence is turned into the principal or his/her designee. A student has three (3) days after returning to school to bring a note explaining absences. The principal or his/her designee shall classify each absence as either excused or unexcused in accordance with this policy and/or state law.

 The principal shall report promptly to the director of schools and/or attendance supervisor the names of all children who have been absent for three (3) days without adequate excuse. Three (3) days shall mean the aggregate of three (3) days during the school year and not necessarily three (3) consecutive days.

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Tier 1

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Tier I of the progressive truancy plan shall apply to all students within the district and include schoolwide prevention-oriented supports to assist with satisfactory attendance. These supports shall include but are not limited to schoolwide promotion of the benefits of regular attendance, teaching the benefits of consistent attendance, building positive relationships with students and families, and educating families on why attendance matters using mailings, call-outs, and social media.

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When a student accumulates three (3) unexcused absences, the principal or his/her designee will send a letter to the parent's address on file, requesting the parent to contact the principal concerning the student's absences. and the student must return a signed copy of the letter to the principal or his/her designee. If the letter is not returned, the parent will be called by school personnel.

When a student accumulates five (5) unexcused absences, the Weakley County Schools Progressive Truancy Intervention Plan goes into effect.

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Tier 2: When a student accumulates five (5) unexcused absences, the student will be placed at Tier 2 and Weakley County Schools will take the following actions:

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1. The Director of Schools will send a certified letter declaring that the student has reached Tier 2 and requiring the parent contact the school to schedule a meeting to discuss the student's absences.

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2. The principal attendance supervisor or his/her designee will meet with the parent and student, document the content of the meeting, and cause a contract concerning attendance to be signed by the principal attendance supervisor, the parent and the student. The contract shall include a schedule of follow-up meetings which may be held by phone.

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3. Parents who do not respond or refuse to meet will be referred to DCS for parental neglect. 4. The family will be referred to the Weakley County Schools Social Worker for assessment

and, if necessary, referral to community-based services.

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Tier 23: If the student does not meet the terms of the contract or accumulates a sixth (6th) unexcused absence three (3) or more additional unexcused absences, the student will be placed on Tier 2 3 and Weakley County Schools will take the following actions:

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1. A member of the Attendance Supervisor's staff will inquire to determine the reasons for absences and hold a meeting (in person or by phone) for discussion. Contract modifications will be necessary.

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2. A community-based service provider will be asked to open a case with the student and parents.

45 46 3. The Attendance Supervisor will notify the Juvenile Office to seek help of the student's progression to Tier 3.

4. Parents who do not respond or refuse to meet will be referred to DCS for parental neglect.

Tier 3: If the student breaks the revised contract by accumulating a seventh (7th) unexcused absence, the student will be placed on Tier 3 and Weakley County Schools will require the parent and student to meet with the Weakley County Truancy Board for adjudication.

If the student accumulates an eighth (8th) unexcused absence, If attendance does not improve after two weeks at Tier 3, or the student accumulates more than two additional unexcused absences or the parents do not participate or cooperate in any tier of the progressive truancy plan, the Attendance Supervisor will charge the parent with Education Neglect of a minor in Weakley County Juvenile Court (after a manifestation hearing is held if the student is receiving special education services). The parent will face possible fines and jail time.

Interference/Disruption of School Activities

Descriptor Code: 6.306

Issued Date: 10/21/2014

The staff is authorized to take reasonable measures to establish appropriate school behavior. Any professional employee shall have the authority to control the conduct of any student while under the supervision of the school system. This authority shall extend to all activities of the school, including all games and public performances of athletic teams and other school groups, trips, excursions and all other activities under school sponsorship and direction.

Such measures may include the use of reasonable force to restrain or correct students and maintain order.

A student shall not use violence, force, noise, coercion, threat, intimidation, fear, passive resistance or any other conduct which causes the disruption, interference or obstruction of any school purpose while on school property, in school vehicles or buses, or at any school-sponsored activity, function or event, whether on or off campus. Neither shall s/he urge other students to engage in such conduct.

Harassment, intimidation and other conduct that may be considered "bullying" will not be tolerated. Students shall not engage in conduct that has the effect of unreasonably interfering with another student's academic development or that creates a hostile or offensive learning environment.

A student found guilty of misbehavior may receive punishment ranging from verbal reprimand to suspension and/or expulsion dependent on the severity of the offense and the offender's prior record.²

REMOVAL OF STUDENT³

If a student repeatedly or substantially interferes with the learning environment, the teacher may submit a written request along with the required documentation to the principal/designee to remove the student from the teacher's classroom. The student will be given notice of the rationale for the request as well as an opportunity to offer an explanation.

The written request shall include documentation that the teacher has previously:

- 1. Taken action to address the student's disruptive behavior;
- 2. Provided consequences for the student's disruptive behavior;
- 3. Conducted an oral conference either by phone or an in-person discussion with the student's parent or guardian regarding the student's disruptive behavior;

- 4. Provided an opportunity for school counseling or other support services deemed appropriate to address the student's disruptive behavior;
- 5. Developed and implemented a plan to improve the student's behavior in a conference with the student; and
- 6. Issued a disciplinary referral to address the student's disruptive behavior.

The principal/designee will investigate the request and make a decision regarding the student's placement. The principal will notify the teacher as to his/her decision.

Appeal Process

If the teacher's request for removal is denied, he/she may file an appeal with the Director of Schools/designee. He/She will review the teacher's request for removal as well as the decision of the principal/designee and make a determination as to the student's placement.
